

UNDER THE *Juscan* SUN

Jessica Bride and Nick Mayor's newly renovated historic home is the setting for a Tuscanthemed shower.

taly and Louisiana have more than a few things in common, including reverence for the past, sensational food, beautiful scenery, profound love of life and a recognizable, boot-shaped geographical footprint. So when Jessica Bride and husband Nick Mayor decided to host a Tuscan-themed bridal shower in their newly renovated Lower Garden District home, the two cultures, like the betrothed — one Italian, the other a Louisianan — seemed like a good match. Bride and Mayor's home provided the perfect backdrop.

Having met in London, where both lived and worked (Bride in the restaurant industry, Mayor in finance), the couple temporarily relocated to Bride's native New Orleans in 2006 while she applied for a new visa. A wrong turn soon proved fateful.

"We were driving Uptown from the Marigny one day. I took a wrong turn, and we saw this house for sale and said 'Wow, that's amazing," Bride recalls of the Greek Revival structure, built in 1847 by commission merchant Hugh Wilson. Uncertain about what the renovation process

Uncertain a bout what the renovation process would reveal, the couple took a chance, purchasing the house in 2007. Working with architect Danny Taylor of Koch & Wilson and Barry Seigel of Bywater Woodworks, the couple transformed the decrepit carriage house at the property's rear ("It was a biohazard," Bride says, only half-joking) into livable quarters where they could stay while renovating the main house, which needed more work than they initially thought.

During the first half of the 20th century, the

property had been converted into a boarding house; in the 1970s it was re-established as a single family home; in the 1980s a partial renovation enclosed its second-floor exterior galleries. When Bride and Mayor bought it, the house had stood unoccupied for six years. Layers of red wool carpeting and linoleum tiles covered portions of the original floors; termites had eaten through some of the plaster lathes and underlying substructure, and the living room's wooden floor had sunken partially to the ground.

"When we pulled up the bowed floor in the living room, we were pleasantly surprised — it turned out to be just the rotted floor joists," Bride says. "But that was the last time we were pleasantly surprised by the construction process. Everything else came in over budget."

The couple stayed the course, and today the house is a juxtaposition of restored 19th century architecture and modern, urban interiors. Bride and Mayor reconfigured portions of the floor plan, added a new kitchen, bath-rooms, air conditioning and heating systems, and new plumbing and electrical wiring. They repaired plaster and moldings, restored the exterior galleries and added a pool. Collaborating with New York-based colorist, decorator and friend Bruce McNally, the couple gave the house a fresh, relevant edge and is still in the process of collecting contemporary works of art, mostly from New Orleans and London.

"In London everything is old and protected — you can't do anything to the outside of a house," Bride says. "But it's really popular to go in and gut and modernize a home on the inside. ... I had more rustic taste, but I developed a love of the modern and the interplay of old and new. The house is definitely a mix of our two styles," Bride adds. "It's something we've come up with together as opposed

to something we would have come up with on our own."

Likewise, the bridal shower was a collaboration of creative talents. Bride put years of restaurant industry experience and more recent studies as an oenophile to work with New York-based private chef Amy Blackburn. Together, they devised a lunch menu of rustic Tuscan fare paired with seven wines selected to enhance the food and match the summer weather.

The morning of the shower, Blackburn shopped at the Crescent City Farmers Market for fresh, local ingredients like Creole and cherry tomatoes. Bride saw to the Tuscan-inspired decor, while hostess Cristina Watts made dessert: vanilla cupcakes filled with fresh Louisiana strawberries, topped with cream cheese whipped cream and drizzled with fresh

Guests were greeted with Bellini cocktails at the front gate. After an hour of mingling, they headed to the tented side lawn where a single table dressed with a white linen tablecloth, burlap runner and potted lavender plant provided seating for the three-course meal. After lunch, biscotti and sparkling dessert wines were served while the honoree opened

gifts surrounded by good friends, good wishes and good cheer.

"[The shower] was an interesting feat of planning," Bride says. "The co-hosts live in New Orleans, Mississippi, Hammond and Donaldsonville, and we converged in New Orleans for a really fun party. Instead of knowing everyone prior to the shower, we became friends as a result of the shower. It was capped off by six of us jumping in the pool. ... I think the day was perfect."
